Description of the Course

In this course, we will explore the topic of second language acquisition (SLA). We will start by looking at some of the differences between learning a first and second language. Next, we will explore the history of second language teaching and learning, and how people have learned over time, including popular approaches of recent years. Then, we will examine the factors which make a good language learner. After that, we will look at the 'systems' and 'skills' that are needed to master a second language. As learners of English and/or other foreign languages, the knowledge gained on this course should help students understand what it is required to become a good language learner.

Instructional Objectives

The goal of this course is both to learn about how second languages are acquired, and for students to apply this knowledge to reflect on their own second language learning. Also, this course aims to practice and develop important listening and note-taking skills for lecture courses.

Course Requirements/ Assignments and Evaluations

Punctuality and Attendance: Students are required to attend all lecture meetings, field observations, and other scheduled events programmed for this course. Excessive tardiness to class and class activities may result in the dismissal of a student from a program.
