

Summer Intensive Japanese Language



The JCMU Summer Intensive Japanese Language program runs every summer and offers beginner (first year) through advanced (fourth year) level Japanese in an intensive format. Students will complete an academic year's worth of college-level Japanese in just 9 weeks, while also immersing themselves in Japanese life and the local community!

Summer (9 weeks):

Coursework

Intensive Japanese Language (10 Credits)

Level 1 (beginner) through Level 4 (advanced)

Daily instruction addresses listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills. Placement is based on exams held at the beginning of the program.

For those seeking a deeper connection, long-term and weekend homestays with Japanese host families (pending availability) offer a unique chance to live the language and culture firsthand.









2026 Summer **Short Programs**



JCMU Summer Short Programs are faculty-led courses offered in May that explore a specific topic within the faculty leader's area of expertise. All programs are open to all students regardless of their major. Courses are taught in English and no previous Japanese language study is necessary.

The topics for JCMU Summer Short Program vary by year. Topics for summer 2026 include:



Religion and Society in Japan (4 cr.)

This immersive course challenges conventional ideas of "religion" by exploring Japan's rich tapestry of ritual, self-cultivation, and social bonds—many of which defy traditional labels. Students will examine how spiritual and communal practices shape identity across diverse socio-economic and ethnic landscapes.

In-class lectures, readings, and discussions are enriched with reflection exercises and field trips to culturally significant sites across Shiga Prefecture and major cities like Osaka, Kobe, and Tokyo—bringing theory to life through direct engagement with Japan's living traditions.



International Trade in Japan (3 cr.)

This dynamic course offers students a hands-on understanding of the evolving trade relationship between Japan and the U.S. Through the lens of history, policy, and logistics, students will explore how political movements and domestic agendas shape international commerce—and how goods actually move across borders.

Field excursions include visit to major international trade ports and key logistics hubs across Japan, including Tokyo and other major cities. Students will engage directly with the infrastructure and experts driving global trade, gaining firsthand insight into the supply chains, shipping systems, and policy frameworks that connect two of the world's largest economies.


